AILET 2024 UG Paper Analysis: Answer Key, Expected Cut-off and Difficulty level

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Introduction

The All India Law Entrance Examination Test (AILET) 2024, held on December 10, was characterized by a moderate to difficult difficulty level and increased length compared to the previous year. Following a pattern similar to 2022, this year's exam featured more passage-based questions and extended to a duration of 120 minutes, as opposed to the usual 90 minutes. With a total of 150 questions to tackle, candidates faced a challenging but structured test format.

AILET 2024 English Section Analysis

Passage 1: The passage explores the transformation of linguistics from a prescriptive to a descriptive approach, emphasizing its multidisciplinary evolution. It highlights the crucial synergy between linguistics and computer science, leading to transformative technologies.

The interdisciplinary collaborations with psychology, neuroscience, and anthropology enrich our understanding of the profound role language plays in human cognition and society. The difficulty level is moderate, requiring a grasp of linguistic theories and their applications through the options.

Passage 2: The passage explores the complex motivations behind the pursuit of awards and certificates, examining self-worth, external validation, and societal expectations. It emphasizes intrinsic acknowledgment but warns against overreliance on external validation.

With a moderate length, the questions necessitated students to both comprehend and infer from the text. In terms of difficulty, both the passage and questions proved slightly more challenging compared to the rest of the section, demanding a heightened level of understanding.

Passage 3: The passage discusses the author's shift from pursuing perfection at the start of the creative process to adopting the "Finished, Not Perfect Method" (FNPM) for efficiency. Drawing on experiences as a working student, it emphasizes the pitfalls of overthinking and the importance of timely completion.

The passage maintains a moderate difficulty level, requiring an understanding of the author's personal evolution and the challenges associated with balancing input from a limited number of opinions to prevent creative paralysis.

Passage 4: The passage discusses the rising mental health challenges among college students, citing National Health Survey statistics on anxiety and depression. It emphasizes the responsibility of institutions in addressing these issues and highlights the crucial role of caring, affirming, and connected communities on campuses.

The passage underscores the significance of supportive networks and culturally responsive mental health services, advocating for a curriculum that integrates cultural values for improved well-being. The difficulty level is moderate, necessitating an understanding of statistics, community support, and culturally responsive approaches to mental health.

Passage 5: Medical schools and institutions are increasingly incorporating Virtual Reality (VR) into their curriculum, offering realistic and immersive simulations for training healthcare professionals. VR allows medical students to practice surgeries, diagnose illnesses, and engage in patient interactions in a controlled and risk-free environment. This hands-on experience enhances confidence and competence before real patient encounters.

The passage is of moderate difficulty, requiring an understanding of the advantages of VR in medical education and the challenges it presents.

Passage 6: Electric vehicles (EVs) are empowering women in Tier 2 markets, with 25% utilizing them to earn a livelihood in sectors like last-mile delivery.

The passage is straightforward, emphasizing the positive impact of EVs on women's economic independence in specific regions. While the passage was short the questions asked were perhaps the easiest and most direct in the entire section.

Passage 7: The passage highlights the drastic changes in community dynamics over the past century, focusing on the decline of intergenerational co-habitation and the impact of urbanization, suburban living, and busy lifestyles on extended families. It notes the diminishing sense of community, weakened neighbor connections, and the influence of social media.

The author laments the loss of the traditional supportive "village" for raising children, leading to families missing out on vital learning experiences and support systems. The passage is moderately challenging, requiring an understanding of societal changes and their effects on family dynamics.

AILET 2024 General Knowledge Section Analysis

The General Knowledge section, spanning questions 51 to 80, presented a moderate challenge compared to the previous year. The segment primarily focused on current affairs, with some static questions, notably emphasizing economics concepts. The question mix aligned with the observed preparation patterns in the Common Law Admission Test (CLAT).

AILET 2024 Logical Reasoning Section Analysis

Marked as the lengthiest and most challenging section, the 70-question, 70-mark segment of the AILET 2024 traversed from moderate to difficult terrain. Notably, legal-oriented principal-fact-based questions were introduced, a departure from previous years.

The critical reasoning component involved long, statement-based inquiries with an emphasis on assumptions and inference. The analytical reasoning (AR) section featured a substantial presence of syllogisms and coding-decoding queries.

As per the AILET Analysis 2024, the overall difficulty level of the Logical Reasoning section was assessed as Moderate – Difficult. This section comprised 52 questions in Critical Reasoning, 10 in Analytical Reasoning, and 8 in Legal Reasoning.

AILET 2024 Analytical Reasoning Analysis

The analytical reasoning section featured a total of nine questions, covering topics such as Coding Decoding (4 questions), Arrangement (3 questions), Linear Arrangement (1 question), and Circular Arrangement (1 question). The questions aimed to test candidates' logical and analytical reasoning skills in these specific areas.

AILET 2024 Legal Reasoning Analysis

The Legal Reasoning section comprised eight questions, covering topics such as Criminal Trespass (Law of Crimes – 1 question), Vicarious Liability (Law of Torts – 4 questions), Place of Suing (CPC – 1 question), Fraud (Crimes – 1 question), and Recklessness (Torts – 1 question). The questions aimed to assess candidates' understanding of legal principles and their application in various scenarios.
