AILET 2026 Exam Analysis

The **AILET 2026** examination was conducted on December 14 (Sunday), and based on expert review and early student feedback, the overall difficulty level of the paper can be classified as **moderate** across all three sections.

The paper followed the familiar pattern traditionally set by National Law University Delhi, focusing on conceptual clarity, logical application, and careful time management rather than introducing unexpected elements.

Students who maintained accuracy, avoided guesswork, and managed time efficiently were clearly at an advantage. The paper rewarded preparation and discipline more than aggressive attempting.

As per the AILET 2026 exam analysis, **English Language, Current Affairs and General Knowledge**, and **Logical Reasoning** were all moderate in difficulty, with Logical Reasoning leaning towards the easier side for well-prepared candidates.

Notably, Logical Reasoning included around **four to five legal reasoning questions**, all of which were straightforward and scoring for students with basic legal awareness.

This detailed AILET 2026 exam analysis provides a section-wise breakdown of difficulty level, question trends, good attempts, and expected cut-off insights to help candidates realistically assess their performance.

The English section rewarded candidates with strong reading speed and vocabulary-in-context skills. Grammar questions were mostly direct, while comprehension passages tested inference and

tone rather than factual recall.

The main differentiator in this section was time usage. Candidates who overthought sentence correction and jumbled sentences often lost valuable minutes. For those who approached it calmly, English served as an effective confidence booster early in the exam.

The Current Affairs and GK section remained largely consistent with previous years. There were no major surprises in terms of pattern or difficulty.

A significant number of questions were drawn directly from well-known preparation sources and standard law entrance modules. Students who maintained regular revision were able to attempt most questions with confidence.

Time management was not a concern for most candidates, making this a stable scoring section provided accuracy was prioritised over blind attempts.

Logical Reasoning emerged as one of the most scoring sections of the paper. With only two passages and a manageable number of questions, both reading load and time pressure remained under control.

The questions closely mirrored official sample papers and previous trends. While some AI-based questions were reported, they did not significantly increase difficulty. Most questions could be solved effectively using option elimination.

Candidates who remained calm and avoided overanalysis were able to maximise their scores in this section.
