2. (a) 450 days = 64 weeks + 2 odd days. Therefore it is Tuesday.

1. (d) 1300 years = (1200 + 100) years = 0 + 5 = 5 days

1. (b) India got Independence of 15th August 1947.

15th August 1947 = (1600+ 300+ 47) + 227 days

= 0 + 1 + 1 + 3

= 5 odd days

Therefore, it is Friday.

2. (a) Since it is exactly 400 years, therefore no. of odd days is 0. Therefore, 2nd March 2090 is Wednesday.

2. (b) Since 2020 was a leap year, therefore there are 2 odd days. Therefore, was January 1, 2021, will be a Friday.
