CLAT 2021: Students Speak Up Against the High Cost of Raising Objections

The deadline to raise objections to the CLAT 2021 paper (UG and PG) ended yesterday.

As per the CLAT notification, *“a fee of **Rs. 1,000/- (Rs. One Thousand only)** is to be paid for each objection and if the objection turns out to be valid, the said fee will be refunded/remitted to the same account from which it was paid.”*

The notification further says that if the candidates *“raise Objections on their own Question Booklet and the Question Number does not match with the Master Question Booklet, CLAT Office will not respond to such objection(s).”*

This condition has come under censure, with students [writing](#) about how this would prohibit people from speaking up. Many have [written](#) on social media as well.

This is especially so since every year’s CLAT has had some form of a hiccup. Whether it is results being republished, or the computers’ malfunctioning, or the question paper being riddled with inconsistencies.

Plus, the fact that CLAT charges Rs. 4,000, which is a pretty steep amount by any standard. Asking students to pay an additional Rs. 1,000 **per question** would be a big hindrance to people wanting to raise grievances.

As it is, more than 70,000 students give the exam. This means that the Consortium of NLUs, which organizes the exam, gets a large sum of money just from the exam fees itself.

The pattern of holding CLAT points to a larger issue that plays out at law schools also. Diversity surveys by NUJS and NLS show that these colleges largely comprise people from high-income families.

If law has to be made a more inclusive space, then it must start from how the induction process works. The Consortium must make amends to the CLAT exam.
