CLAT PG 2027: Syllabus and Exam Pattern

CLAT PG is the entrance exam for admission to LLM programmes at National Law Universities (NLUs) in India. It is conducted by the **Consortium of National Law Universities**. - Every question is based on a short passage or extract taken from court judgments, bare acts (statutes), or legal commentary.

- After reading the passage, you answer objective-type questions that test:
 - Understanding of the passage
 - Application of the legal principle to a new fact situation
 - Ability to identify the correct legal rule or exception
