In Conversation with Prachilekha Sahoo, Assistant Professor of Law at School of Law, Centurion University of Technology and Management

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In this conversation with CLATatalogue, Prachilekha Sahoo talks about her venture into the domain of law, her law school experience and her journey as an Assistant Professor of Law.

I have worked in Amity Law School, Amity University Jharkhand as Assistant Professor following which I got an offer to join as a founding faculty member in School of Law, Centurion University of Technology and Management.

How did you start your journey in the domain of law? How were your initial years in law school?
