Dr. Ambedkar and Discussions on Constitutional Morality

Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, who had a broader view of how people in India understand and follow the rules of the Constitution believed that many Indians didn't have a strong sense of "constitutional

morality.”

He thought that even though India has a system of democracy, it’s like a new layer placed on top of something that isn’t naturally democratic.

In a meeting where they were discussing the Constitution, Ambedkar responded to the criticism that a lot of the Constitution was taken from the Government of India Act, 1935, including specific administrative details.

He admitted feeling sorry about including these details in the Constitution from an act that was enacted by and favored the British.

But he explained that in a country where people don’t naturally understand and respect the principles of the Constitution and Constitutional morality, it’s necessary to have these details to make sure the government works according to the spirit of the Constitution and for limiting any scope for abuse of power.

Without these details, the administration might not follow the values of the Constitution, even if the formal structure remains the same.

Ambedkar also said that this sense of “constitutional morality” needs to be developed among the people. He believed that the Constitution should also serve as a tool to teach the Indian population about democratic values.

According to him, many Indians didn’t have a strong democratic mindset. The Constitution was not just a set of rules but also a way to educate people about how a democracy should work.

Joseph Shine v. Union of India (2018)

Legal Challenge to the Constitutional Validity of Section 497 of the Indian Penal Code, On Adultery. The Supreme Court invalidated the law because it contravened constitutional morals by perpetuating the notion of women as the possessions of their husbands.

The ruling emphasized the significance of gender equality and personal autonomy per constitutional values. The court's decision to remove discriminatory laws and defend fundamental rights was guided by constitutional morality.

Indian Young Lawyers' Association v. State of Kerala (2018)

The following case concerned a legal dispute regarding prohibiting women of reproductive age from entering the Sabarimala shrine. The court affirmed the primacy of constitutional morality

concerning religious practices.

The court's ruling determined that excluding women violated their fundamental rights and the norms of equality. The verdict acknowledged the dynamic character of constitutional morality, which adjusts itself to the prevailing social ideals.

Government of the NCT of Delhi v. Union of India (2018)

This case dealt with the analysis of the allocation of powers between the elected government of Delhi and the Lieutenant Governor. Former Chief Justice Deepak Misra parallels constitutional morality and the 'basic structure theory.'

The court emphasized that constitutional character is crucial in maintaining a balanced government and upholding democratic principles. The ruling reaffirmed that individuals and officials must carry and abide by constitutional morals.
