The purpose of the Presidential appointment is to guarantee that the persons picked have the highest level of integrity, competency, and impartiality necessary to protect the sanctity of the

democratic process.

The Indian Constitution includes provisions on the term and removability of the Election Commission and its members to protect their independence. Article 324 of the Indian Constitution concerns the composition, appointment, and duration of the Election Commission.
