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ENGLISH COMPREHENSION

Questions 1-10: Read the passage carefully and answer the questions that follow.

Common law is to large extent based on case law.' Case law' consists of rules and principles stated and acted upon by judges in giving decisions. Some branches of the common law are based on statutes and others are entirely the product of the decisions of the judges whose reasoned judgements have been reported over the years in various law reports.

With the advent of the British rule and the consequent reception of common law into the Indian legal system significant developments have followed with regard to use and the theory of the precedent in India. The two factors, which have significantly contributed to the emergence of a viable doctrine of judicial precedent in India are the organisation of courts in hierarchical structure and the emergence of authentic law reports.

According to Blacks Law Dictionary, a precedent is a decided case that furnishes a basis for determining later cases involving similar facts or issues. If we place ourselves in the position of a judge in a later case, there may be said to be many different kinds of precedents.

A judge may simply be obliged to consider the former decision as part of the material on which his present decision could be based, or he may be obliged to decide the case before him in the same

way as that in which previous case was decided unless he can give a good reason for not doing so. Finally, the judge in the subsequent case may be obliged to decide it in the same way as that in which the previous case was decided, even if he can give a good reason for not doing so.

In the last-mentioned situation the precedent is said to be 'binding' or of 'coercive effect' as contrasted with its merely 'persuasive' effect in the other situations in which the degree of persuasiveness may vary considerably.

Only that precedent is binding on a court which is on all fours with the case before it. If the facts in both cases are the same, the decision is said to be 'on authority'. If the facts of the case are different and the judge merely acts on the analogy of a previous rule, he expounds a new principle of law and his decision is said to be 'on principle'.

There are two methods of judicial decisions: deductive and inductive. In the case of deductive method, the general legal rule is already fixed and certain and the same is applied in individual cases by judges. The latter are not required to use their own brains. Their function is merely to apply the law which is clearly laid down in the same way as a student of geometry uses the axioms.

In the case of inductive method, the judge has to start from a particular case and come to general principle of law. The process is from particular to the general. According to Allen, in one method, antecedent decisions are helpful only as illustrations of a general propositions; in the other way they are the very soil from which the general propositions must be mined.-

In a contract with a minor, if the other party hands over any money or confers any other benefit on the minor, the same shall not be recoverable from the minor unless the other party was deceived by the minor to hand over money or any other benefit. The other party will have to show that the minor misrepresented her age, he was ignorant about the age of the minor and that he handed over the benefit on the basis of such representation. However, in the case of a minor for whom, a guardian has been appointed or declared before the age of 18 years, the age of majority will be 21 years, not 18
