Questions 12-16: Answer based on information provided in the passage:

The AAP will hope that the Assembly polls are a referendum on its government's work. Delhi, the Union Territory (UT) that hosts India's capital city, might lag several states in total population and in area, but it enjoys outsize significance in terms of media and political attention. With 1.47 crore electors spread across the largely metropolitan national capital region and its pockets of rural voters in some suburbs, Delhi is expected, in polls scheduled on February 8, to reprise the three-cornered electoral fight which has been the norm in recent elections.

The Aam Aadmi Party, which graduated from a social movement to a political party less than a decade ago, will now seek to stand on its governance record, five years after nearly sweeping the Assembly results in 2015. The Bharatiya Janata Party will hope that unlike in Maharashtra, Jharkhand and Haryana, the legions of voters who supported it in the Lok Sabha election will not transfer their votes to its competitors, while the Congress will seek to regain the support of the UT's poorer and marginalized sections, most of whom shifted allegiance to the AAP in 2015.

The AAP, if multiple opinion polls are to be believed, is on a strong wicket despite its setback in the Lok Sabha election where it won only 18% of the votes for the third place behind the BJP's 56.6% and the Congress' 22.5%. A Centre for the Study of Developing Societies-Lokniti survey of May 2019 found that most of Delhi's voters who voted against the AAP for other parties in the national elections wanted the party to return to power in the Assembly election. This dichotomy in support could be explained by the reasonable satisfaction among voters with the welfare and development work done by the Arvind Kejriwal led government.

A PRS Legislative research report has shown that Delhi spends the most – nearly 40% of its overall budget allocation compared to an average of 23% elsewhere in India-on education, health, water supply and sanitation between 2011 and 2019. The AAP's focus on improving government-run primary education, health care (the Mohalla clinic scheme in particular), lowering electricity and water supply costs besides easing public transport woes (through schemes such as free ridership for women in government-run buses) has earned the party strong campaign points.

This could not yield dividends in May, as the party still does not have a coherent ideological position or a national presence, while voters were concerned with other issues such as national

security that favored the BJP. The AAP's incoherence on questions related to ideology was a drawback then, and that is the reason why it will seek to turn the polls into a referendum on its tenure. The BJP hopes to challenge the AAP on this turf after passing a Bill in December 2019 that came up with a legal framework to provide ownership rights to those living in Delhi's unauthorized colonies. Whether this recent gesture, that is of importance to the roughly five million people in such areas, will sway voters remains to be seen.

The university is an ideal place to reflect. It is a magnet for people who like to be critical, in the two meanings of the word: “Inclined to find fault” and the “art or act of judging the quality” of something. Many academics are certainly inclined to find fault. But that becomes useful when it is combined with the art of judging quality: to see beneath, above, and beyond the obvious, to the deeper and higher meaning of important things. This is what can make the university such a powerful setting for the development of managers. And it is what makes so unfortunate current trends in the business schools toward hype and “businesslike” behavior.

The classrooms common in business schools today line up students in neat rows so that they can all see the professor. That setup may be fine for conveying information from the front, but it hardly facilitates sharing among everyone else. Arching these rows in the shape of a U so that the students can also see each other for case discussions may be an improvement, but that puts attention on the individual, not the group, especially that individual at the front, in the so-called pit. These are classrooms designed more for competition than collaboration, for making points more than for sharing experiences. They speed things up; they do not slow them down.

The classroom may not be the workplace, but it should at least be compatible with it. A flat classroom with round tables facilitates natural discussion in small groups alongside formal presentations. There is no need to “break out”. Managers can go in and out of reflective discussions on a moment’s notice. Each table becomes a little learning community, within the larger learning community that is the whole classroom. And by varying how people sit “company groups, by job concerns, cross-culturally, and so on” the focus of discussion around the tables can be varied.

Surprise inputs from students in the form of intriguing questions or trivia about the topic at hand should not be treated as a hindrance to the flow of a teacher and instead, be welcomed as an opportunity to learn from. While the conventional classroom clearly shows itself to be designed for the faculty, this kind of seating allows the managers to assume co-ownership of the space. Adaptable educating in a flexible space requires an adaptable and facilitating faculty. The faculty

certainly must be designers “architects of the learning experience” but as architecture was discussed earlier: not by designing and drawing, to create rigid structures, but by establishing flexible superstructures that can adapt to the people inside.

The faculty, in other words, must be the designers of an ongoing social process as much as the conveyers of conceptual knowledge. And unlike most architects today, they must remain on site while their designs become reality. Bloom has likened this role to midwifery, in that the faculty help facilitate a perfectly natural process. Just because people are called professors does not mean they have to spend so much time professing.

Based on the risk of international spread of poliovirus, the World Health Organization announced on January 7 that polio will continue to remain a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC) for three months. The decision was taken based on the recommendation of the emergency committee under the international health regulations that assessed the situation last month. The committee arrived at the unanimous decision based on the "rising risk" of international spread of wild poliovirus type 1.

Polio was declared a PHEIC in 2014 and has continued to remain one since then. There were 156 cases of wild polio type-1 cases in 2019 compared with 28 in 2018. With 128 cases, Pakistan accounted for the greatest number of cases, while Afghanistan reported 28 cases. Besides the four-fold increase in cases, there were instances of the wild type-1 virus getting exported from Pakistan to Iran and Afghanistan, as also on the spread from Afghanistan to Pakistan. In addition to the virus causing polio in children, it was found in the environment in Pakistan and, to a lesser extent, in Afghanistan. This is particularly a concern as the number of children not vaccinated in Afghanistan has been increasing.

In 2018, a total of 8,60,000 children in Afghanistan did not receive polio vaccine due to security threats. The situation did not improve in 2019 and, as a result, a large cohort of children in the southern region of the country remains unprotected. Therefore, even other parts of the country that have been free of the virus in the past are at risk of outbreaks.

An equally disturbing development is on the outbreak of vaccine-derived poliovirus cases in 16 countries; in all, there were 249 vaccine-derived poliovirus cases in 2019. Surprisingly, of them, only 30 were in countries where vaccine-derived poliovirus is endemic.

The rapid emergence of multiple circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type-2 strains in several countries is unprecedented and very concerning, and not yet fully understood, the committee noted. But not a single case of vaccine-derived poliovirus was reported from Afghanistan, while Pakistan had just 12 cases. In comparison, the number of cases in Angola was 86 and the Democratic Republic of the Congo was 63. While Nigeria reported 18 cases of vaccine-derived poliovirus, not a single cases of wild poliovirus type-1 has been reported from the country for over three years; the last reported case was in August 2016.

Eight days after 9/11, as United States combat jets began bombing Taliban positions across Afghanistan, General Pervez Musharraf went on air to warn his nation it stood at a fateful crossroad. In and outside the Pakistan Army, powerful voices were urging the country to defy America, and fight alongside the Taliban to defend its Islamic Emirate. “Our critical assets,” Pakistan’s military ruler responded, “are our sovereignty, second our economy, third our strategic assets, and fourth our Kashmir cause. All four will be harmed if we make the wrong decision,” he warned.

“Bravery without thinking is stupidity.” In a closed-door briefing to Pakistan’s political leadership this week, Army chief General Qamar Bajwa and Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) director-general Lieutenant-General Faiz Hameed made much the same speech again. Islamabad’s influence with

the Taliban had waned as its victory neared. The Army's calls for the Taliban to end fighting and share power in Afghanistan, the Generals explained, weren't being heeded. The Taliban remained enmeshed with the Tehrik- e-Taliban Pakistan, or TTP, as well as al-Qaeda.

For twenty years, the ISI nursed the Taliban in the darkness, plotting its triumph. As the last American troops withdraw from Afghanistan, and the Taliban reach for military victory, their dream is revealed to be a nightmare. Despite this bitter experience, a succession of envoys for United States presidents—from Richard Holbrook to Zalmay Khalilzad—gambled that the ISI would be able to deliver the Taliban.

America knew the ISI was providing the Taliban with safe havens and resources. Islamabad was, moreover, unwilling to allow negotiations which excluded it. In 2010, it detained top Taliban leader Abdul Ghani Baradar, suspected of negotiating with the United States, and only released him eight years later.

Yet, the potential payoff from a deal seemed high. "We need Pakistan's army and ISI to dismantle al-Qaeda," former Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) chief George Tenet reasoned, "and Pakistan's stability and interests are at least as important to the United States as Afghanistan's recovery from Taliban rule."

The Supreme Court stayed the implementation of three controversial farm laws, calling its order “extraordinary” and a “victory for fair play”. The Court formed a four-member committee of experts “to listen to the grievances of the farmers on the farm laws and the views of the government and make recommendations”.

At one point in the 11- page order, a [N]-judge Bench led by Chief Justice of India (CJI) Sharad A. Bobde said the formation of an expert committee “may create a congenial atmosphere and improve the trust and confidence of the farmers”. The stay, the court said, “may assuage the hurt feelings of the farmers” and make them confident enough to scythe their way to the negotiating table in good faith. In a concluding paragraph of the order, the court said the farmers’ bodies would “perceive” the “extraordinary” stay as an achievement of their peaceful protest “at least for the present”. It may convince these organisations to “encourage” their members to go home to

their livelihoods, and thus, protect their lives and health and that of others too.

The court said several rounds of negotiations between the Centre and farmers had produced no results, even as senior citizens, women, and children among the protesters were exposed to serious health hazards posed by the cold and COVID-19. It noted that deaths, not due to violence, but either of illness or by way of suicide, had occurred already. The court lauded the peaceful nature of the protests and stated that it did not want to stifle it.

However, it noted Attorney General [ABC]’s “support” of a “specific averment” by the Indian Kisan Union that an organisation, Sikhs for Justice, banned for anti- India secessionist movement, is financing the agitation. The court order made it clear that farmers’ bodies “shall” participate in the discussions of the committee. “The representatives of all the farmers’ bodies, whether they are holding a protest or not and whether they support or oppose the laws shall participate in the deliberations of the committee and put forth their viewpoints,” it directed. The order explained that both the government and farmers should take the court’s effort to form a committee in the “right spirit” and consider it an attempt to reach a “fair, equitable and just solution to problems”.

In 2017, the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare introduced the National Health Policy, which for the first time, envisaged the creation of a digital health ecosystem in the country. Subsequently, the Prime Minister announced the launch of the National Digital Health Mission (NDHM) to give fruition to the idea of unified digital healthcare.

One of the primary goals of NDHM is the creation of a Unique Health Identifier (UHID) which would facilitate integration of health data across various applications and create a longitudinal Electronic Health Record (EHR) for citizens. Essentially, this UHID is meant to be a repository of all health-related information for each citizen of the country. From its very inception, the Unique Health Identity Scheme was promised to be a voluntary exercise whereby obtaining the consent of a citizen was mandatory before generating a Health ID for them.

Curiously, what has taken effect in practice is that from around April-May 2021, the National Health Authority (NHA), which is the organization responsible for implementation of the NDHM, has been surreptitiously issuing Health IDs to citizens, under the garb of procuring personal information including Aadhaar details for the vaccination drive against COVID-19. Neither prior consent nor intimation that their Aadhaar details will ultimately be used to create a Unique Health ID have been given to the citizens. It is absolutely shocking to see that till date, the average Indian citizen is not even aware that they now possess a 14-digit Health ID, which has been

dubiously incorporated in the electronically generated vaccination certificate.

This exercise has also not been uniform for all citizens. Despite the usage of Aadhaar not being mandatory, it appears that Health IDs have only been created for citizens who provided their Aadhaar Card for verification. Others, who furnished their PAN Card or other identity cards have not yet been allotted the UHID. While it may be argued that citizens willfully shared their Aadhaar details, it has to be borne in mind that this consent was for the sole and standalone purpose of verifying their identity at the time of vaccination and not for the creation of a Health ID.

Therefore, in the absence of the necessary knowledge of the purpose for which data is being collected, valid consent could not have been given. Such actions are in direct violation of Section 6(3) of the Aadhaar and other Laws Amendment Act, 2019 which provides that voluntary use of the Aadhaar number by way of authentication means the use of such Aadhaar number only with the informed consent of the Aadhaar number holder.

What is even more baffling is that the NDHM has been implemented in the absence of any legislation that gives legal backing to it or even envisages its implementation. It is a settled position in law that government policies or guidelines which have not been framed under any statute or provision of the Constitution of India, are not considered as statutory in nature, and are instead merely executive instructions/administrative guidelines, compliance whereof cannot be enforced through courts. Thus, non-adherence to such policies is implicitly permissible, which leaves the citizens remediless in case of deviations by the government.

Unfortunately, the current way Health IDs are being created for citizens without furnishing basic information regarding the infrastructure that will be used in setting up this digital ecosystem, is grossly unconstitutional and it is about time that the state comes clean and takes accountability for its actions.

A recent order passed by the Odisha State Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission has raised the question of liability of online marketplaces in cases of defective products or services. The State Commission held Amazon liable in a case where a law student's order for a laptop placed at a discounted rate of Rs. 190 was cancelled soon after it was confirmed.

The State Commission observed that Amazon was negligent in providing service and that cancelling the said order after confirmation was an unfair trade practice. Accordingly, Amazon was directed to pay Rs. 40,000 as compensation (Rs. 30,000 for mental agony and harassment along with Rs. 10,000 towards punitive damages) and Rs. 5,000 as costs.

In this matter, though no one appeared on behalf of Amazon in the final hearing, the e-commerce giant had previously filed written arguments stating that the agreement was between a third-party seller (who operated through Amazon's website) and the consumer, and therefore, there was no privity of contract and no question of negligence and/or deficiency.

However, the State Commission rejected the said argument and observed that when Amazon, which is a reputed online shopping website, made an offer and the complainant placed the order accepting that offer, the agreement stood completed between the parties. The State Commission further clarified that it would have been a different case had there been a cancellation before the order was confirmed. However, when Amazon allowed the third-party seller to operate on its platform, its responsibility cannot be lost sight of, the order stated.

While the above decision may be welcomed by consumers, it creates far-reaching consequences for online marketplaces like Amazon, Flipkart etc. The law is not crystal clear in respect of the liability of these companies, as conflicting orders have been passed by different State Commissions. In the absence of clear provisions, and with increasing adverse rulings against Amazon and other similar marketplaces, consumers would be encouraged to file complaints against such online marketplaces.

This may not only increase the prices consumers pay for the products (to balance the litigation burden) but may also lead to fewer products being available at such platforms. Additionally, in a country like India, many small-scale businesses which host their products on online marketplaces may not even be able to bear the burden of such increased consumer litigation if the facilitator is entirely removed from the equation. The only thing one can do is to wait and watch as to how this controversy is settled either by the legislature or by the judiciary.
