Lore has it my father once wrestled a black bear in Baluchistan with his bare hands [3]. If the story had been about anyone else, it would have been dismissed as *_laaf_*, that Afghan tendency to exaggerate—sadly, almost a national affliction; if someone bragged that his son was a doctor, chances were the kid had once passed a biology test in high school. But no one ever doubted the veracity of any story about Baba.

And if they did, well, Baba did have those three parallel scars coursing a jagged path down his back. I have imagined Baba's wrestling match countless times, even dreamed about it. And in those dreams, I can never tell Baba from the bear. It was Rahim Khan who first referred to him as what eventually became Baba's famous nickname, *_Toophan agha_*, or "Mr. Hurricane."

It was an apt enough nickname. My father was a force of nature, a towering Pashtun specimen with a thick beard, a wayward crop of curly brown hair as unruly as [2] the man himself, hands that looked capable of uprooting a willow tree, and a black glare that would "drop the devil to his knees begging for mercy," as Rahim Khan used to say.

At parties, when all six-foot-five of him thundered into the room, attention shifted to him like sunflowers turning [1] the sun. Baba was impossible to ignore, even in his sleep. I used to bury cotton wisps in my ears, pull the blanket over my head, and still the sounds of Baba's snoring—so much like a growling truck engine—penetrated the walls.

And my room was across the hall from Baba's bedroom. How my mother ever managed to sleep in the same room as him is a mystery to me. It's on the long list of things I would have asked my mother if I had ever met her.

In the late 1960s, when I was five or six, Baba decided to build an orphanage. I heard the story through Rahim Khan. He told me Baba had drawn the blueprints himself despite the fact that he'd had no architectural experience at all. Skeptics had urged him to stop his foolishness and hire an architect.

Of course, Baba refused, and everyone shook their heads in dismay at his obstinate ways. Then Baba succeeded and everyone shook their heads in awe at his triumphant ways. Baba paid for the construction of the two-story orphanage, just off the main strip of Jadeh Maywand south of the Kabul River, with his own money. Rahim Khan told me Baba had personally funded the entire project, paying for the engineers, electricians, plumbers, and laborers, not to mention the city officials whose “mustaches needed oiling.”

Current Affairs, including General Knowledge

Each set of questions in this section is based on topics that arise out of the excerpted passage. Answers may be implied by facts mentioned in the passage but need not be so. Please answer each question on its merit based on your knowledge of current affairs and general knowledge.

PASSAGE

At the 'International Council for Bird Preservation' conference held in Tokyo in 1960, it was decided that each country should designate a 'National Bird'. [1], the 'Birdman of India', recommended the [2] (*Ardeotis nigriceps* or GIB) as the 'National Bird' of India. Ali's fervent hope was that such recognition would lead to an urgent nationwide effort to save the endangered bird from impending doom. This sound advice was not taken; some said that its name could be misconstrued. The peacock (*Pavo cristatus*) was declared the National Bird in 1963. The graceful GIB lost to the more numerous and colorful peafowl.

On March 21, 2024, this critically endangered bird – numbering less than 150 individuals – has provoked the Supreme Court to expand citizens' constitutional right to life and equality to include the right to be free from the adverse impact of climate change. The public interest litigation filed by eminent conservationist Dr M.K. Ranjitsinh sought a series of directions to protect the GIB from extinction. In 2021, the Supreme Court passed directions restricting and regulating power lines and renewable energy projects in an area of 99,000 sq km in the states of Rajasthan and Gujarat, in order to protect the GIB.

The Supreme Court's latest ruling on the protection and conservation of the GIB (M.K Ranjitsinh Versus Union of India), while modifying directions passed in the earlier judgment, has implications beyond the facts of the case. Chief Justice D.Y. Chandrachud – writing for a three-judge bench comprising Justices J.B. Pardiwala and Manoj Mishra – in his characteristic eloquent style, has expanded the contours of environmental jurisprudence: from the oft-repeated polluter pay principle–precautionary principle–public trust doctrine to the larger arena of climate justice, environmental inequity and gender justice.

For long, environmental disputes have been looked at from the narrow prism of an 'environment versus development' debate; in the latest judgment, the court went beyond this binary and sought to address some of the contentious issues from both constitutional and international legal perspective and principles. While there are concerns about the over-emphasis on the benefits of

renewable energy in the judgment, in many ways it is precedent setting – nationally as well as globally – and is likely to be an effective tool for securing environmental justice in a world that is becoming increasingly hotter and drier. Some of the key elements of the judgment require a deeper analysis.

PASSAGE

As the Supreme Court reserved its judgment on Thursday (April 18) on a batch of pleas seeking complete cross-verification of votes cast using EVMs, experts have questioned some of the arguments put forward in court, pointing out that several pertinent suggestions were overlooked and facetious issues discussed instead.

The crux of the argument is end-to-end verifiability, by which the voter can verify whether the VVPAT slip has the name of the candidate of her choice and put the slip in a box.

[1] is a suggestion given by a body of experts from across the globe in a report prepared by the [2]. The is an intervenor in the SC case and was initially represented by [3].

A bench of Justices Sanjiv Khanna and Dipankar Datta wanted to know whether the voter could be given the slip to put in a box, an action that would ensure that the voter has verified their vote.

The Election Commission of India (ECI), however, told the court that the secrecy of the vote would be lost if the slip was to be given in the hands of the voter to put in the box.

The ECI also said, "One doesn't know what the voter would do with the slip after taking it. There could also be deliberate mischief."

CCE convenor and retired IAS officer M.G. Devasahayam, who is one of the intervenors in the case, told The Wire this was a facetious argument.

"Why would a voter who has come to cast his vote actually put the slip in his pocket and walk off, and how can the secrecy be violated? Take the recent case of Chandigarh. It was a government official doing the mischief, not the voter," he said.

Lawyer Aljo Joseph says end-to-end verifiability is possible without disturbing the existing setup.

PASSAGE

Appearing for the Delhi Police on Tuesday, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta said he had no objection to the release of Jamia Millia Islamia student Safoora Zargar on “humanitarian grounds”. The 27-year-old was arrested by the Delhi Police’s Special Cell in April and charged under the draconian UAPA for her alleged role in the communal violence in Northeast Delhi in February.

In her bail plea, Zargar listed pregnancy as one of the grounds for seeking relief. Following the SG’s submission, the Delhi High Court granted her bail. But the 27-year-old’s more than two-month-old ordeal—she was denied bail twice by sessions courts in Delhi—raises fundamental jurisprudential questions.

Why was the cardinal principle of criminal justice, “presumption of innocence until proven guilty”—enshrined in Article 11(1) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and invoked by the Indian judiciary in a number of cases—not applied in this case? Why should an accused be compelled to seek bail on humanitarian grounds? Does the Constitution offer protection against prolonged imprisonment to an undertrial?

The Code of Criminal Procedure does not define bail. But in *Gurbaksh Singh Sibbia vs. the Supreme Court* underlined, “The act of arrest directly affects freedom of movement of the person arrested by the police, and speaking generally, an order of bail gives back to the accused that freedom on condition that he will appear to take his trial”.

The Court talked about Article 21 and added that “the personal liberty of an accused or convict is fundamental, suffering eclipse only in terms of procedure established by law”.

More recently, in 2018, in *Dataram Singh v. State of Uttar Pradesh*, the apex court held that “The grant of bail is the general rule, and putting a person in jail is an exception”. Delivering the verdict, Justice Madan Lokur lamented: “Unfortunately, some of these basic principles appear to have been lost sight of, with the result that more and more people are being incarcerated and for longer periods.” He, too, invoked Article 21 and said that overcrowding of prisons affects the “dignity” of convicts.

The SC has repeatedly emphasized the “humane” treatment of the accused, including in the *Dataram Singh* case. As the Court pointed out, “conditions for the grant of bail ought not to be so strict as to be incapable of compliance”. It flows from the spirit of the apex court’s rulings, therefore, that bail should not be made to appear as an act of charity, as in the *Zargar* case, because it emanates from constitutional principles.

PASSAGE

During the lockdown, Section 188 of the Indian Penal Code was widely invoked against those not following it. In a communication to the states on March 24, the Home Ministry said persons violating the containment measures will be liable to be punished under provisions of the Disaster Management Act 2005, besides Section 188 IPC. A look at these and related provisions:

For disobedience

Section 188 of the IPC deals with those disobeying an order passed by a public servant and provides for imprisonment ranging from one to six months. For those violating orders passed under the Epidemic Diseases Act, Section 188 IPC is the provision under which punishment is awarded.

Section 51 of the Disaster Management Act, 2005, provides for punishment for two kinds of offenses: obstructing any officer or employee of the government or person authorized by any disaster management authority for the discharge of a function; and refusing to comply with any

direction given by the authorities under the Act. Punishment can extend to one year on conviction, or two years if the refusal leads to the loss of lives or any imminent danger.

For spreading fear

Section 505 IPC provides for imprisonment of three years or a fine, or both, for those who publish or circulate anything that is likely to cause fear or alarm. Section 54 of The Disaster Management Act provides for imprisonment, extending to one year, for those who make or circulate a false alarm or warning regarding a disaster or its severity or magnitude.

For a false claim to aid

Under Section 52 of the Disaster Management Act, whoever makes a false claim for obtaining “any relief, assistance, repair, reconstruction, or other benefits” from any official authority can be sentenced to a maximum of two years imprisonment, and a fine will be imposed on the person.

For refusing to do duties

In the event of the refusal or withdrawal of any officer who has been tasked with any duty under the Act, the officer can be sentenced to imprisonment extending to one year. However, those who have the written permission of the superior or any lawful ground are exempt from such punishment. A case cannot be initiated without explicit sanction from the state or central government.

Legal shield

For any offense under the Disaster Management Act, a court will take cognizance only if the complaint is filed by the national, state, or district authority, or the central or state government. However, there is another provision: if a person has given notice of 30 days or more about an alleged offense and about his or her intention to file a complaint, he or she can approach the court, which can then take cognizance.

The Act protects government officers and employees from any legal process for actions they took “in good faith”. Under the Epidemic Diseases Act, too, no suit or other legal proceedings can lie against any person for anything done or intended to be done in good faith.
