

MCQs on the Indian Penal Code [Part 2]

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Read the passages and answer the following questions.

Passage 1

Passage 2

Adultery, as defined under Section 497 of the Indian Penal Code (IPC), refers to a voluntary sexual relationship between a man and a woman when either of them is married to someone else.
