

Notes on Legal Effects of Divorce

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Introduction

Divorce is the legal dissolution of marriage **[Also Read: Concept of Talaq under Muslim Law]**. It is a legal process through which the couple seeks to end their marriage. Different countries have different divorce laws, and either party or both parties can start the process. Divorce is a civil matter in some nations, like the United States, while it is a subject of personal laws in others, like India.

In some cases **[Also Read: Dissolution of Marriage under Hindu Marriage Act, 1955]**, the marriage can be declared null and void. This means that the marriage never existed in the first place, and the parties are considered to have never been married. This is different from a divorce, where the marriage is considered to have existed but has now been legally terminated.

a “live-in relationship” only if they had lived together for a significant period of time and had held themselves out to the public as being akin to spouses.

5. Anil Kumar Jain Case (2017): This case dealt with the issue of alimony for men. The Supreme Court ruled that men could also claim alimony from their wives in cases where they were unable to support themselves financially. This decision helped to provide greater gender equality in divorce cases.
6. ABC vs. The State (2015): This case dealt with the issue of child custody in cases of inter-country adoption. The Supreme Court held that the welfare of the child should be given the highest priority in such cases, and that the best interests of the child should be the guiding principle for determining custody.
7. Danial Latifi Case (2001): This case dealt with the issue of maintenance for Muslim women. The Supreme Court held that Muslim women are entitled to maintenance under the Muslim Women (Protection of Rights on Divorce) Act, 1986, and that it is the husband’s duty to provide for his wife even after the dissolution of the marriage.
