Legal Reasoning Questions for CLAT UG-Part V

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PASSAGE

The Land Acquisition for Public Purposes Act allows the government to acquire private land for projects serving the public interest, provided it pays fair market compensation. “Public interest” includes infrastructure, schools, and hospitals. Acquisition must be necessary and proportionate to the stated purpose.

A government plans to build a large sports complex and acquires agricultural land from several owners. One owner challenges the acquisition, arguing the project primarily benefits a private sports club that will manage the facility. The government claims it will also be open to the public during certain hours.

The Supreme Court has previously held that for a project to qualify as public interest, the primary and dominant purpose must serve the public, even if some private benefit exists.

The Employee Privacy and Monitoring Guidelines allow employers to monitor workplace communications for legitimate business purposes, provided employees are informed in advance

and monitoring is proportionate. Personal communications accessed without consent are prohibited unless required by law.

A company installs software tracking all employee emails and messages, including those sent during breaks on personal accounts accessed via office Wi-Fi. Employees argue this is an invasion of privacy. The employer says it is necessary to prevent data leaks.

The Supreme Court has ruled that workplace monitoring must balance business interests with privacy rights, and that monitoring personal communications without cause is disproportionate unless legally mandated.
