Similarly, allocating public resources in ways that favor politically influential constituencies while legal may violate the principle of impartiality. These tensions are further complicated by the growing role of media and public opinion, which can incentivize performative governance over substantive outcomes.

Some scholars argue that ethical governance requires more than legal compliance; it demands a commitment to principles that may, at times, conflict with political self-interest. Others maintain that in representative systems, responsiveness to public will, even if ethically imperfect, is itself a democratic virtue. Navigating these competing imperatives involves continual judgment, and perhaps, a willingness to sacrifice popularity for the sake of public good.
