The international human rights framework is built on the premise that certain rights are universal, inalienable, and applicable to all individuals, irrespective of their nationality, culture, or political system.

This principle has led to the development of treaties, conventions, and monitoring bodies aimed at ensuring that states uphold these rights. However, the assertion of universality often collides with claims of national sovereignty, the idea that each state has the authority to govern itself without external interference.

Some states argue that human rights norms, particularly those concerning gender equality, freedom of speech, and minority rights, reflect the cultural and political values of specific regions and are not universally applicable. They contend that attempts to impose such standards constitute a form of moral imperialism that undermines self-determination.

Proponents of universality counter that cultural relativism can be used to justify oppression and evade accountability. They argue that allowing states to pick and choose which rights to recognize weakens the moral foundation of the human rights regime.

This tension raises questions about how to reconcile respect for cultural diversity with the enforcement of international norms, especially in a global order that lacks a central enforcement authority.
