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PASSAGE

As artificial intelligence systems become more integrated into decision-making processes—in sectors ranging from healthcare and finance to criminal justice, they raise fundamental questions about legal responsibility. Unlike traditional tools, many AI models operate with a degree of autonomy and opacity, often making it difficult to trace the logic behind their decisions. This “black box” nature complicates efforts to assign liability when harm occurs.

Consider a scenario in which an AI system used by a hospital misdiagnoses a patient, leading to serious consequences. Should responsibility lie with the software developer, the medical practitioner who relied on the recommendation, or the institution that deployed the technology? Current legal frameworks are ill-equipped to resolve such dilemmas, as they are grounded in human agency and clear chains of causation.

Some scholars argue that responsibility should rest with the human operators who chose to implement the system, even if they did not fully understand its internal workings. Others propose that developers and companies should be held accountable, particularly if the algorithm was poorly designed or inadequately tested. A third view suggests the need for an entirely new legal category—such as “algorithmic agents”—to capture the unique nature of AI-driven actions.

These divergent positions reflect a deeper tension between innovation and accountability. As society grows more reliant on automated systems, there is a pressing need to reconcile the benefits of technological advancement with the ethical and legal imperative of redress for harm.
