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PASSAGE

Universal Basic Income (UBI) has emerged as a contentious policy idea in economic circles. UBI proposes that every citizen receives a fixed, unconditional sum of money from the government regularly, regardless of employment status or income level. Proponents argue that it can alleviate poverty, reduce inequality, and provide a safety net in the face of automation-driven job losses. By giving individuals the freedom to pursue education, caregiving, or creative endeavors without the pressure of economic survival, UBI is seen as a means of enhancing individual autonomy and social stability.

Critics, however, caution against the economic feasibility of UBI. They argue that the vast fiscal resources required to fund such a program could result in higher taxes or reallocation from essential services like healthcare or education. Additionally, some contend that unconditional transfers may reduce the incentive to work, leading to reduced productivity and slower economic growth.

Empirical trials in countries like Finland and Kenya have shown mixed results—while recipients report improved mental health and financial security, effects on labor market participation have been minimal. Moreover, questions remain about the scalability and long-term sustainability of such programs in larger, more complex economies.

The UBI debate ultimately revolves around competing values: economic efficiency versus social equity, and the role of the state in redistributing wealth in a rapidly changing economic landscape.
