Explanation: Ultra vires means “beyond powers.” Administrative authorities derive their authority from statutes. If they act beyond that authority, courts invalidate such actions through judicial review. This doctrine ensures that administrative bodies remain within the limits of their statutory mandate.

2. Correct Answer: B - Lack of authority vs failure to follow procedure

Explanation: Substantive ultra vires occurs when an authority lacks legal power to perform an act. Procedural ultra vires occurs when the authority has power but fails to follow the procedure prescribed by law, such as mandatory consultation or hearings.

3. Correct Answer: B - Ensure fairness in administrative decision-making

Explanation: Legitimate expectation protects individuals when public authorities create expectations through consistent practice or promises. Even if no legal right exists, the doctrine ensures procedural fairness before expectations are denied.

4. Correct Answer: B - Pecuniary interest

Explanation: A financial interest creates automatic disqualification because it undermines impartiality. The rule against bias ensures that decision-makers remain neutral and independent.

5. Correct Answer: B - Action must not exceed what is necessary

Explanation: Proportionality requires administrative measures to be appropriate, necessary, and balanced relative to their objectives. It prevents excessive restrictions on rights.

6. Correct Answer: C - No reasonable authority test

Explanation: The **Wednesbury principle** invalidates decisions that are irrational or absurd to such an extent that no reasonable authority could have taken them. It is a very high threshold for judicial intervention.

7. Correct Answer: B - Expertise and flexibility

Explanation: Modern governance requires specialised knowledge and quick responses. Legislatures therefore delegate rule-making authority to administrative bodies that possess

expertise and flexibility.

8. Correct Answer: C - Laying procedure

Explanation: Delegated legislation is often required to be laid before Parliament or legislatures, allowing them to scrutinise or annul the rules.

9. Correct Answer: B - Determining factual conditions

Explanation: Conditional legislation occurs when the legislature enacts a law but leaves its operation contingent upon certain facts determined by an authority.

10. Correct Answer: C - Transparency and fairness

Explanation: Providing reasons prevents arbitrary decisions and allows affected persons to understand the basis of administrative action, facilitating judicial review.
