Answers

1. C - Kesavananda Bharati v. State of Kerala

Explanation: This landmark decision upheld Parliament's power to amend any part of the Constitution, but subjected it to the limitation that the basic structure cannot be altered.

2. C - Declaring that Article 13 does not apply to constitutional amendments

Explanation: It overturned *Golaknath* by stating that constitutional amendments are not "law" under Article 13.

3. A - 73rd

Explanation: The 73rd Amendment introduced Part IX and institutionalised Panchayati Raj in rural areas.

4. B - Added maximum number of changes in one amendment

Explanation: It made sweeping changes to Fundamental Rights, DPSPs, judicial review and federal structure.

5. A - 61st

Explanation: The 61st Amendment broadened democratic participation by lowering the voting age.

6. A - Inserted Right to Education as a Fundamental Right

Explanation: It inserted Article 21A, making free and compulsory education for children aged 6-14 a Fundamental Right.

7. B - 102nd

Explanation: The 102nd Amendment gave constitutional status to the NCBC by inserting Articles 338B and 342A.

8. B - Anti-defection law

Explanation: It inserted the Tenth Schedule to curb political defections.

9. C - 101st

Explanation: The 101st Amendment introduced GST and created the GST Council.

10. C - Requiring written advice of the Cabinet

Explanation: It ensured that Emergency could be proclaimed only on written advice of the Cabinet.

11. C - *Minerva Mills v. Union of India*

Explanation: In *Minerva Mills*, the Court struck down clauses that gave Parliament unlimited amending power, holding that limited amending power itself is part of the basic structure.

12. A - Cooperative societies

Explanation: It added Part IX-B, giving constitutional status to cooperative societies.

13. C - 104th

Explanation: The 104th Amendment extended SC/ST reservation while discontinuing Anglo-Indian nomination.

14. A - Remove judicial scrutiny of property acquisition

Explanation: It aimed to prevent courts from questioning adequacy of compensation in land acquisition.

15. B - 42nd

Explanation: The 42nd Amendment altered the Preamble to reflect ideological commitments of the State.
