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Passage 1 (P.1)

My family has always been on intimate terms with medical error. My brother lived with myotonic dystrophy for two decades before anyone gave it a name. My twin sister, by luck, was diagnosed sooner by a visiting locum. Before that, she was handed a grab bag of incorrect labels by her doctors: depressed, tired like everyone else, or simply suffering from 'wear and tear'. It seemed she was offered anything but the truth, including candour from the physicians who didn't know. Luck, in medicine, can also be oddly cruel. My late partner's stomach cancer was discovered only after years of missed signals about his congenital heart condition. By the time doctors recognised the heart problem, they discovered his cancer had already taken root.

For me, these are not abstract stories about system failure – they are family history. But they are also part of a wider, more astonishing reality: medical error is among the leading causes of death worldwide. In the US, it is estimated that around 800,000 people die or become permanently disabled each year from diagnostic error alone.

At this point, many argue that the solution lies with technology. If errors are inevitable in human hands, perhaps machines can steady them, or even replace them altogether. Enter Dr Bot. Depending on who you ask, the machine is either a saviour or a saboteur. Most commonly, the vision is one of man and machine working side by side: the algorithm whispering in the doctor's ear, the human hand guiding the treatment. A doctorly duet, not a duel.

Passage 2 (P.2)

Recently, I visited a part of my neighbourhood where there’s a park. The green space was hived off by concrete walls, iron railings and barbed wire. From inside came the sound of laughter and the happy voices of men and boys. Outside, I saw women of all ages walking on the dusty road, banned from entering the park. I spotted some school-age girls carrying books and pens, talking together and walking the same path I once walked. Something about their seriousness threw me back to my own youth.

I was fortunate enough to attend school, study in the faculty of my choice and eventually build a career in a field that I loved – despite my path being filled with challenges. But I felt such sorrow for these girls, unable to pursue higher education or the jobs that they’d be passionate about. Afghanistan is facing a dark time, identical to the one I faced at the beginning of my own career.

Once more, Afghan women and girls are being forced to pay the price of their freedom for the country’s uncertain future. I know exactly how they must feel. I faced the same struggle more than 30 years ago.

June 1992. Until that moment, I would not have left my job if it cost me my life. Despite the constant bombings and the daily hailstorm of bullets and rockets, I always showed up at work. But I had little choice.

It started like this: it was the early days of the mujahideen government. I was preparing to record a show at the studios of the National Radio and Television of Afghanistan (RTA), papers spread in my hands, when the new head of television, who had links to the mujahideen, walked in, saw me, and quickly looked away, muttering under his breath in disgust.

He had a quiet word with the producer before leaving the studio. When I asked why the TV director had reacted that way, the producer told me that the director opposed women working and that, by refusing to look at me, he'd shielded himself from sin.

That day I carried a strange feeling home. How could I continue to work with people who looked upon women with such loathing? There's a Persian proverb: *The pride of the poor is the death of the poor.*

Although I desperately needed my job, I was so furious I could think of nothing except resigning. I had no idea who I would become without work and the freedom it gave me, a freedom I wanted all women to enjoy.

But it hardly mattered, since very soon after I quit, most of the female employees at the television station were fired. I would never have imagined then that, 30 years later, the situation for women in Afghanistan would be far worse.

Now, as I approach the end of my working life, amid the most extreme and far-reaching oppression of women I have yet witnessed in this country, I am overwhelmed by a sense of déjà vu, as if the past is doomed to repeat itself.

Answers & Explanations

1. D - The author here is reflecting on what happened back then and is connecting it with how medical system is failing us. Since there is no analysis, satire or explanation of anything, option d stands as best of all.
2. B - The author via the given passage is trying to paint an idea of how AI can be inculcated in the medical field as an assistance to the doctors and not replacement of doctors. All other options are just one aspect of the main idea, and option d is wrong.
3. C - The author has inculcated his stories so that he can make the audience emotionally connected to the passage so that they can feel the pain of the author/victim and can think according to his/her pov.
4. B - "Saviour or Saboteur" means either one will be saved or sabotaged/ruined. Usage of direct meaning.
5. C - "Duel" refers to contrast between opposing parties, all other options except "Duet" is a synonym to the Duel. Whereas Duet means composition of two people.
6. A - Direct meaning applied.
7. C - This option is correct because it talks about what the whole passage is actually trying to say, by drawing contrast between the time periods and discussing the current scenario.
