Passage 1 (P.1) Joint liability arises when two or more persons are held legally responsible for the same obligation or wrongful act. Under this principle, each person involved in the act may be held liable for the entire damage caused, regardless of the extent of their individual contribution. The rationale behind joint liability is that when individuals act together to cause harm, the law treats them as collectively responsible for the consequences of their actions. In civil law, joint liability commonly arises in situations where multiple parties collaborate in committing a wrongful act, such as negligence or tortious interference. For instance, if two individuals jointly engage in conduct that leads to injury or property damage, the injured party may recover the entire amount of damages from any one of them. It is then the responsibility of the person who paid the damages to seek contribution from the other wrongdoers. This principle is particularly significant in cases where it may be difficult to determine the precise degree of fault attributable to each individual involved. By imposing joint liability, the law ensures that the victim is not deprived of compensation merely because responsibility cannot be perfectly apportioned. However, joint liability typically arises only when the parties have acted in concert or where their actions combine to produce a single, indivisible harm. If the harm caused by each person can be clearly separated, courts may impose several liability instead, meaning each person is responsible only for the portion of damage they individually caused. The doctrine also serves a deterrent function by discouraging individuals from participating in collective wrongdoing. When individuals understand that they may be held responsible for the entire harm caused by a group, they may be less willing to engage in activities that could lead to injury or loss to others. **1. unlawful assembly is defined as a gathering of five or more persons with a common objective that is illegal or that threatens public order. The law recognises that when individuals assemble with a shared purpose that involves committing an offence or using criminal force, the collective nature of their conduct poses a greater risk to society than the actions of a single individual. The concept of unlawful assembly is based on the idea of common object, meaning that all members of the assembly share a particular purpose that is unlawful or likely to lead to unlawful acts. Once such a common object is established, every member of the assembly may be held responsible for offences committed by any member in pursuit of that common object. Importantly, a person does not need to actively participate in the commission of the offence to incur liability. Mere membership in an unlawful assembly, combined with knowledge of its unlawful objective, may be sufficient to establish responsibility. However, if a person joins the assembly without knowledge of its unlawful purpose, or withdraws from the group before any offence is committed, liability may not arise. Similarly, if an offence committed by a member of the group was entirely unrelated to the

common object of the assembly, other members may not be held responsible. The law therefore recognises that collective behaviour can amplify the potential for violence and disorder. By imposing liability on all members who knowingly participate in an unlawful assembly, it aims to discourage individuals from associating themselves with groups that intend to engage in illegal activities. **6. Passage 3 (P.3) In traditional Hindu law, a Hindu Undivided Family (HUF) is a family unit consisting of lineal descendants from a common ancestor along with their spouses and unmarried daughters. The management and control of the family's affairs are typically vested in a person known as the Karta, who is usually the senior-most

member of the family. The Karta occupies a unique position within the HUF. As the head of the family, the Karta has authority to manage family property, conduct business on behalf of the family, and represent the family in legal matters. The Karta's powers include entering into contracts, managing joint property, and making decisions necessary for the benefit of the family. However, the Karta's authority is not unlimited. The Karta is expected to act in the interest of the family and cannot misuse family property for purely personal purposes. Transactions undertaken by the Karta are generally binding on the other members of the HUF if they are carried out for legal necessity or for the benefit of the family. Legal necessity may include actions such as paying family debts, performing essential religious ceremonies, or meeting expenses necessary for the maintenance of family members. If a transaction by the Karta is shown to have been made without necessity or benefit to the family, other members may challenge it. The position of Karta therefore combines elements of authority and responsibility. While the Karta is empowered to manage family affairs efficiently, the law also seeks to ensure that such authority is exercised in a manner that protects the interests of all members of the family.

applies when actions are connected. Here, the accidents are independent and unrelated, so joint liability is least likely. **D** - The main purpose is to ensure that the victim still gets compensation

even if it is difficult to divide responsibility among wrongdoers. **B** - Since all members shared the same unlawful objective, everyone can be held liable for acts done to achieve that objective, even

if only one person actually did it. **A** - If the act was completely unrelated to the group's common purpose, then only the person who committed it is responsible. **B** - The person did not know the

unlawful purpose initially and left once they found out, so they can avoid liability. **B** - The most important element is a shared unlawful objective among the group members. **C** - A peaceful and

lawful gathering does not qualify as an unlawful assembly because there is no illegal common

objective. **A** - The Karta can sell property if it is necessary for the family, such as paying debts, so the action is valid. **A** - If the business is started for the benefit of the family, the Karta is acting
