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PASSAGE 1:

Water scarcity has become one of the most pressing global challenges of the twenty first century. Although the Earth is covered mostly with water, only a small fraction is fresh and usable. Population expansion, industrial pollution, inefficient agricultural practices, and rapid urbanisation have placed unprecedented pressure on freshwater sources. South Asia presents a particularly complex picture.

The region contains some of the world's largest river systems such as the Ganga, Indus, and Brahmaputra, yet it experiences recurring water stress. Climatic variations, seasonal dependence on monsoons, and the uneven distribution of water across regions contribute to the crisis.

In addition to natural factors, geopolitical issues also influence water availability. Several rivers in South Asia cross national borders, which makes water sharing a sensitive subject. Historical agreements, resource claims, and changing national priorities often complicate negotiations.

Moreover, groundwater extraction has increased rapidly over the past four decades. Studies have shown that declining aquifers could become a major point of concern, as millions rely on groundwater for drinking and agriculture.

Urban centres face their own challenges. Cities such as Chennai, Karachi, and Dhaka have experienced severe water shortages. Ageing pipelines, leakages, contamination, and uneven supply create gaps between demand and availability.

Governments across the region have proposed strategies such as rainwater harvesting, wastewater treatment, watershed management, and stricter pollution controls. However, implementation often falls short due to institutional limitations and inadequate funding.

Experts argue that if South Asia does not prioritise sustainable water governance by mid century, the region could face economic losses, weakened agricultural output, and even displacement due

to ecological stress.

International organisations have urged the countries to adopt cooperative approaches rather than competitive ones. Regional frameworks for climate adaptation and resource sharing have been discussed at various forums, but progress remains uneven.
