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1. Under Section 14(1)(c) of the Specific Relief Act, a contract which runs into minute and numerous details is:

- a) Not specifically enforceable

Correct Answer: a) Not specifically enforceable

Explanation: Under Section 14(1)(c), contracts that run into minute or numerous details or are dependent on the personal qualifications/volition of parties cannot be specifically enforced. This is because courts cannot effectively supervise such detailed performance and ensure compliance with exactitude.

2. In which of the following cases can a third party enforce specific performance of a contract?

- a) When they are a beneficiary under the contract
- b) When they are legally representing one of the parties
- c) When they are a transferee of interest from the party entitled to specific performance
- d) When they have suffered losses due to breach of contract

Correct Answer: c) When they are a transferee of interest from the party entitled to specific performance
