

Principle Fact Questions for CLAT UG 2025

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1. Principle: An agreement in restraint of marriage is void.

Facts: A agrees to pay B Rs. 1,00,000 if B does not marry for five years.

Is the agreement valid?

- a) Yes, as it involves money.
