

Sample Questions for CLAT 2023: English

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Read the passage and answer the questions :

Passage 1

Neo-Nazis and other extremists have been held responsible for a wave of ethnic cleansing in the Bratiloyan Republic. The United Nations estimates that over 20,000 people have been murdered there in the last six months. Dissidents who have escaped from the country have asked the British Government to grant them asylum.

The Government is to deport 500 illegal aliens whose visas have expired. Angry members of the opposition have accused the Government of institutional racism, as most of the deportees are of African origin. Meanwhile, the police have been accused of harassment, after Asian families in Bradford complained that they have been pestered and worried by officers following a series of robberies in the city. Civil rights leaders in the USA have held a demonstration in Washington against death penalty. They have called for a total abolition of capital punishment, claiming that it is contrary to basic civil rights principles outlined in the United Nations Declarations of Human Rights.

Rebels fighting the government of President Stanislow have taken control of the television station in the center of the capital. This follows a long-standing power struggle between Mr. Stanislow and the principal opposition party which has seriously weakened his power.

A spokesman for the homeless community in London has presented a petition to the Government asking them to provide housing for everyone. He argues that the government's refusal to raise the minimum wage rate has resulted in thousands living in poverty with not enough money to pay for somewhere to live. Meanwhile, the Metropolitan Police evicted several squatters who took over a house in the city center last week and refused to leave until the Government took positive action.

A recent survey reveals that at least 30% of public companies have been accused of discrimination and exploitation in the past year. The main offender is Anglo-Amalgamated Telecommunications, a Bristol based company. Their employees, many of them Asian women,

claim they have received bad treatment or been taken advantage of by the company.

And finally, the Cardiff police are preparing for angry scenes at the Welsh International Computer factory tomorrow when blacklegs, anxious to return to work after six months on strike, will attempt to break through the picket line. A senior officer has expressed his concern that there will be riots and people will get hurt as a result.

Passage 2

Amory Blaine inherited from his mother every trait, except the stray inexpressible few, that made him worthwhile. His father, an ineffectual, inarticulate man with a taste for Byron and a habit of drowsing over the Encyclopedia Britannica, grew wealthy at thirty through the death of two elder brothers, successful Chicago brokers, and in the first flush of feeling that the world was his, went to Bar Harbor and met Beatrice O’Hara.

In consequence, Stephen Blaine handed down to posterity his height of just under six feet and his tendency to waver at crucial moments, these two abstractions appearing in his son Amory. For many years he hovered in the background of his family’s life, an unassertive figure with a face half-obliterated by lifeless, silky hair, continually occupied in “taking care” of his wife, continually harassed by the idea that he didn’t and couldn’t understand her.

But Beatrice Blaine! There was a woman! Early pictures taken on her father’s estate at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, or in Rome at the Sacred Heart Convent—an educational extravagance that in her youth was only for the daughters of the exceptionally wealthy—showed the exquisite delicacy of her features, the consummate art and simplicity of her clothes. A brilliant education she had—her youth passed in renaissance glory, she was versed in the latest gossip of the Older Roman Families; known by name as a fabulously wealthy American girl to Cardinal Vitori and Queen Margherita and more subtle celebrities that one must have had some culture even to have heard of.

She learned in England to prefer whiskey and soda to wine, and her small talk was broadened in two senses during a winter in Vienna. All in all Beatrice O’Hara absorbed the sort of education that will be quite impossible ever again; a tutelage measured by the number of things and people

one could be contemptuous of and charming about; a culture rich in all arts and traditions, barren of all ideas, in the last of those days when the great gardener clipped the inferior roses to produce one perfect bud.

In her less important moments she returned to America, met Stephen Blaine and married him—this almost entirely because she was a little bit weary, a little bit sad. Her only child was carried through a tiresome season and brought into the world on a spring day in ninety-six.

Answers : ENGLISH LANGUAGE (QUESTION NO. 1-10)

1. (a)

Explanation: “Ethnic cleansing” has been defined as the attempt to get rid of (through deportation, displacement or even mass killing) members of an unwanted ethnic group in order to establish an ethnically homogenous geographic area.

2. (b)

Explanation: The passage talks about various instances where human rights were violated and where people had to experience discrimination.

3. (b)

Explanation: The civil rights leaders in USA have called for a total abolition of capital punishment. They claim it is a ruthless form of justice and it is contrary to the basic civil rights principles outlined in the United Nations Declarations of Human Rights.

4. (d)

Explanation: The Government of the UK has refused to raise the minimum wage for workers. This led to people not being able to afford a place to live.

5. (d)

Explanation: Dissident is a person who opposes official policy, especially that of an authoritarian state.

6. (c)

Explanation: Beatrice Blaine is the mother of Amory Blaine.

7. (b)

Explanation: The passage presents Beatrice’s marriage as a footnote, something almost not worth mentioning: the result of weariness more than love. Hence the answer is “incidental,”

which means “occurring as a result of something else” or “hardly important.”

8. (c)

Explanation: Beatrice Bane has a good taste for whiskey and soda as given in the passage. She is also beautiful and charming. The passage also mentions she is educated. The only option left is (c). Hence, the answer is (c).

9. (a)

Explanation: Beatrice has learned gossip and the names of various celebrities, so her education could be described as “superficial” or shallow. We also know that her education was “measured by the number of things and people one could be contemptuous of and charming about,” so the education is both judgmental and entrancing; further, the education concerns “. . . barren of all ideas,” which indicates that Beatrice’s knowledge is pretentious. All in all, we get a picture of an education that, while shallow in some ways, is highly rarified, not at all “mundane” or commonplace.

10. (d)

Explanation: The sentence in question begins a series of several sentences that list the many varied arts and skills Beatrice acquires during the “renaissance glory” of her youth. The implication is that “renaissance” is being used as it is in the phrase “renaissance man:” to describe someone who has various passions and areas of expertise. The best word to capture these interests and skills is “multifaceted.”

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
