1. (B) The foundation for international cooperation to preserve the ozone layer was established by the Vienna Convention of 1985. It cleared the path for the Montreal Protocol but did not enforce legally obligatory reductions.

2. (A) Developed nations were subject to legally binding emission reduction objectives under the Kyoto Protocol, 1997.
3. (C) The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), which oversees environmental initiatives within the UN system, was established as a result of the 1972 Stockholm Conference, the first international environmental summit.
4. (C) The most successful environmental agreement is the 1987 Montreal Protocol, which effectively phased out CFCs and other ozone-depleting chemicals.
5. (B) Through nationally determined contributions (NDCs), the 2015 Paris Agreement seeks to keep global warming far below 2°C, ideally 1.5°C.
6. (B) The 1971 Ramsar Convention emphasises the preservation and prudent use of wetlands, particularly those of global significance.
7. (B) The global framework for addressing climate change was established by the UNFCCC in 1992, which subsequently gave rise to the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement.
