Passage 1 (Q1-Q3):

India's urban population is expected to grow by 416 million by 2050. Despite this, most Indian cities still operate on outdated urban planning frameworks. Experts argue that without investing in resilient and inclusive infrastructure, cities will become increasingly unlivable. At the same time, rapid urbanisation is placing immense stress on transport, housing, sanitation, and healthcare systems. Some suggest that technology-driven solutions—like smart mobility and waste tracking—could offer partial relief. However, critics caution that technological interventions without social and environmental planning may widen inequalities.

Q. No.	Correct Answer	Explanation

1	C	The central concern is the risk of cities becoming unlivable due to outdated urban planning and growing population pressure. Other options are either too narrow (A), inaccurate (B), or dismissive (D).
2	B	The passage supports technology as helpful but warns it is insufficient without social/environmental planning. Hence, B captures the nuance.
3	B	If cities are already implementing smart solutions successfully, it weakens the concern about outdated infrastructure and planning.
4	B	The main point is that while fiction and empathy are correlated, the link could also be explained by other factors. B correctly reflects this conclusion.
5	B	Empirical evidence that empathy improves after reading fiction strengthens the causal argument between fiction and empathy.
6	C	The passage assumes that reading (especially fiction) can impact emotional traits like empathy—hence assumes emotional development is influenced by reading.
7	B	The author objectively outlines both the benefits and drawbacks of the new law without taking sides—this tone is evaluative and neutral.
8	B	A significant drop in energy bills supports the claim that the policy has environmental benefits—hence strengthens the policy’s rationale.
9	C	The economic impact of the policy was not studied in advance, making this the most logically sound criticism based on the passage.
10	D	Supporters assume that environmental benefits outweigh economic harms without substantiating or quantifying both sides—this is a reasoning flaw.
