Skills to Acquire as a First Year Law Student

Once this step is done, speaking in front of people on stage will seem easier.

- Learn to think fast. Yes, slow thoughts will lead to stammering on stage, or atleast a lack of words will result in a long awkward pause in your speech. Therefore read a lot, talk a lot with people and think a lot. This will improve your mind's speed of churning out words.
- Master the language. If you prefer to speak in English on stage, you must master it. Bad grammar or vocabulary will always be a hurdle. Learn more words and their meanings. Use them daily.

Research

Anywhere you go, research will always come in handy. In fact, anywhere you go, research will always be a necessary skill.
