The Constituent Assembly of India: The People Who Wrote Our Constitution

What Was the Constituent Assembly?

The Constituent Assembly was the body entrusted with one historic task: to draft the Constitution of independent India.

It was formed in 1946, while India was still under British rule. After independence in August 1947, the same Assembly took on the responsibility of framing the Constitution. It functioned for almost three years, finally adopting the Constitution on 26 November 1949, which came into force on 26 January 1950.

This was not just a legal exercise. It was a political, social, and moral project aimed at shaping the future of a deeply diverse nation.

Who Were the Members of the Constituent Assembly?

The Constituent Assembly had 389 members originally, which later reduced to 299 members after Partition.

How Were They Chosen?

- Members were not directly elected by the public.

- They were elected by the provincial legislative assemblies.
- Seats were roughly allocated based on population.
- Representation was given to different communities, provinces, and princely states.

Who Were These Members?

The Assembly included:

- Lawyers
- Freedom fighters
- Social reformers
- Economists
- Academicians
- Leaders from different regions, castes, religions, and ideologies

Importantly, the Assembly had **15 women members**, including Hansa Mehta, Durgabai Deshmukh, and Rajkumari Amrit Kaur. For its time, this was progressive.

Key Figures and Their Roles

Dr. B. R. Ambedkar

- Chairman of the Drafting Committee
- Often called the chief architect of the Constitution
- Played a crucial role in shaping Fundamental Rights, equality, and safeguards for marginalized communities

Dr. Rajendra Prasad

- President of the Constituent Assembly
- Ensured smooth functioning of debates and procedures
- Later became India's first President

Jawaharlal Nehru

- Moved the Objectives Resolution, which laid down the philosophical foundation of the Constitution
- Advocated for democracy, secularism, and socialism
- His vision heavily influenced the Preamble

Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel

- Headed important committees related to federalism and integration of princely states
- Played a key role in shaping Centre-State relations
